



COLLABORATION

Specialty court programs provide treatment and other services to meet the needs of program participants.

Each specialty court program is comprised of a collaborative and non-adversarial team which is led by a judge and may include a coordinator, treatment staff, prosecutor(s), public defender(s), law enforcement representative(s), case manager(s), probation officers and others who work together to ensure that the program operates according to all applicable standards and policies.

LOUISIANA DRUG AND SPECIALTY COURTS

Funds for Louisiana's drug and specialty courts are primarily appropriated by the Louisiana Legislature and administered by the Supreme Court Drug and Specialty Court Office (SCDSCO). The SCDSCO awards funds annually to programs and monitors each program's operations througout the year.

The SCDSCO works with Federal and State partners, such as the Dept. of Public Safety and Corrections, the Dept. of Children and Family Services, the LA Dept. of Health, and the LA Highway Safety Commission, to ensure accountability and promote best practices in existing specialty court programs. The office also assists with planning efforts of jurisdictions establishing new specialty court programs.



LOUISIANA DRUG AND SPECIALTY COURTS




In 2022, there were 71 operational specialty courts in Louisiana. These include Drug Courts, Family Preservation/ Intervention Courts, Reentry Courts, Behavioral Health/Co-Occurring Courts, Sobriety/DWI Courts and Veterans Courts. These courts are led by a judge who works with a team of experts to ensure that they operate according to appropriate standards and policies. The SCDSCO is committed to providing necessary training to specialty court judges and team members, and has offered over twelve trainings in 2022.

WHAT IS FAMILY PRESERVATION COURT?








WHY IS IT NEEDED?

- Across the country, 80% of families that are involved in child welfare have a substance use disorder.
- In 2021, Louisiana was third in the country with most drug related deaths per capita.
- In 2022, 2,463 people died from drug overdoes in State of Louisiana

- Recovery parents participating in FTCs appear to enter treatment more quickly, stay in treatment longer, and complete treatment at higher rates.
- Reunification families participating in an FTC were approximately twice as likely to reunify as families receiving conventional services.
- Re-entry The increase in family reunification rates did not appear to have any effect on the risk of repeat maltreatment or re-entry.
- Remain at home children of FTC participants experience fewer removals and fewer placement changes while in foster care.



HOW DOES IT WORK?

- Team Approach multidisciplinary team
 - Collaborative and Family Centered
- Trauma Informed
- More Intensive treatment and oversight
- Non- adversarial approach
 - Use Incentives and Adjustments to Treatment instead of jail/sanctions









HOW TO CHOOSE PARTICIPANTS?

- We accept referrals from all team members.
- Potential participants are informed of the program at the 72-hour hearing.
- Voluntary program



HOW TO GET STARTED?

- 1. Get trained in SUD and best practices in treatment
- 2. Build your team
- 3. Create a Steering Committee
- 4. Build your Policies and Procedural Manual
- 5. Create your Participant Handbook
- 6. Apply for certification with Louisiana Supreme Court
